

BIODIVERSITY

Biodiversity is the variety of all species of plants, animals and microorganisms and the ecosystems in which they interact.


Biodiversity has direct benefits for humans. For example:

- Climate regulation which impacts temperature and rainfall
- Nutrient cycling supports food production
- Carbon sequestration

Measuring biodiversity is challenging – because only a small proportion of species are known.

Over half the ACT's environment – 55% of 235,813 hectares is contained in nature reserves or national parks. However, a range of plant and animal species are at risk.
